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BRIAN'S WINTER - A Novel Study: OVERVIEW

This novel study is designed with flexibility for the teacher in mind. The first section, "For The Teacher", contains useful information about the novel, suggested teaching strategies, possible pre-reading activities, post-reading activities, and an answer key. The second section, "For The Student", consists of reproducible worksheets and activities for students. Vocabulary activities followed by comprehension questions, encouraging students to answer in complete sentences, form the core of this section. As well, more open-ended "optional" activities such as discussion questions, research assignments, cloze activities, literary devices, independent investigations, and creative writing assignments have been included to build flexibility into the unit.

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Synopsis

Brian's Winter is the exciting sequel to Gary Paulsen's award winning novel, **Hatchet**. The novel's premise offers readers an intriguing alternative to **Hatchet's** dramatic conclusion - What if Brian had not been rescued? What if he had been forced to survive an entire winter in the Canadian wilderness?

A Canadian winter is unrelenting and merciless and Brian quickly realizes that to have any chance of survival, he must be ever-vigilant and innovative. Larger, more powerful hunting implements are needed - a war bow, a lance, and larger arrows tipped with flint heads - weapons Brian uses to bring down both a moose and a deer. Warmer clothes and a warm, dry shelter become desperate priorities, as well as a way of getting around in the deep snow so that he can gather wood and hunt for food.

Each and every challenge proves Brian to be a determined and creative survivor. He learns to cope with loneliness and co-exist with a pack of wolves and a skunk, whom he nicknames, *Betty*.

When Brian hears an unusual popping sound one cold winter morning, he sets out to investigate. He is amazed to find human tracks not far from his camp. The tracks, he discovers, were made by a Cree family who are trapping the area. With his rescue now imminent, Brian is torn emotionally. He is overjoyed at the prospect of being reunited with his family, but already feels a tremendous attachment to the scene of his greatest adventure. These conflicting emotions set the stage for the next installment in Brian Robeson's adventures - **Brian's Return**.

Author Biography

Gary Paulsen was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota on May 17, 1939. He was an "army brat" and his family moved from base to base, never staying more than a few months in any one place. As a consequence, Paulsen did not excel in school, either academically or socially. He embraced books and reading at an early age thanks to the kindness and support of a friendly librarian. "When she handed me a library card, she handed me the world!"

Paulsen has lived an adventurous life, but one filled with many hardships, addictions, bitterness, and health problems. His life has been tumultuous and sometimes miserable. He ran away from home at age 14. During his life he has been a carnival worker, farm labourer, soldier, ranch hand, carpenter, truck driver, sailor, trapper, and satellite technician. He has entered the demanding Alaskan Iditarod dogsled race twice. Paulsen worked as a magazine proofreader in Hollywood before moving to northern Minnesota, where his career as an author began. His diverse life adventures and experiences have provided ample inspiration from which he weaves his amazing tales.

Paulsen takes his writing seriously and due to this dedication, he has written almost 200 books and short stories. His strong desire to engage young adult readers to embrace and observe the world around them has earned him numerous literary awards and much recognition of his work.

Pre-Reading Activities

1. **Survival** is a major theme of **Brian's Winter**. Imagine you have been stranded in the northern wilderness without modern tools or conveniences. Describe how you would go about accomplishing one or more of the following tasks. Make sure your description contains enough detail so that someone would be able to follow your instructions if trapped in the wilderness like Brian.

- ⇒ building a fire
- ⇒ making warm clothing for winter
- ⇒ finding ways to kill animals (i.e. fashioning weapons, building traps)
- ⇒ making a secure, warm and dry shelter
- ⇒ making essential tools or instruments such as needles for sewing, fish hooks, traps, snares, snowshoes, etc.
- ⇒ investigate which berries, leaves, roots, etc. you might find in northern Canada which are edible



2. **Brian's Winter** is a story of surviving a winter with little in the way of modern conveniences (no house, winter clothing, food, tools, etc.). Describe three major problems that you think Brian will encounter? Describe how he might overcome these difficulties.

Post-Reading Activities

1. Gary Paulsen's sequel to **Brian's Winter**, **Brian's Return**, tells the exciting story of Brian's return to the scene of his adventures. What do you think would draw Brian back to the area? What misgivings might he have about a return visit?
2. Choose your favourite scene from the novel and work with a small group of your classmates to write a theater script for it. Be careful about including a scene which involves any animal life, as this would be difficult to include in a play. Select a few props to help the audience identify with the scene and perform it for the rest of the class.
3. View the video, **A Cry in the Wild** (the film adaptation of **Hatchet**), then view the following chart:

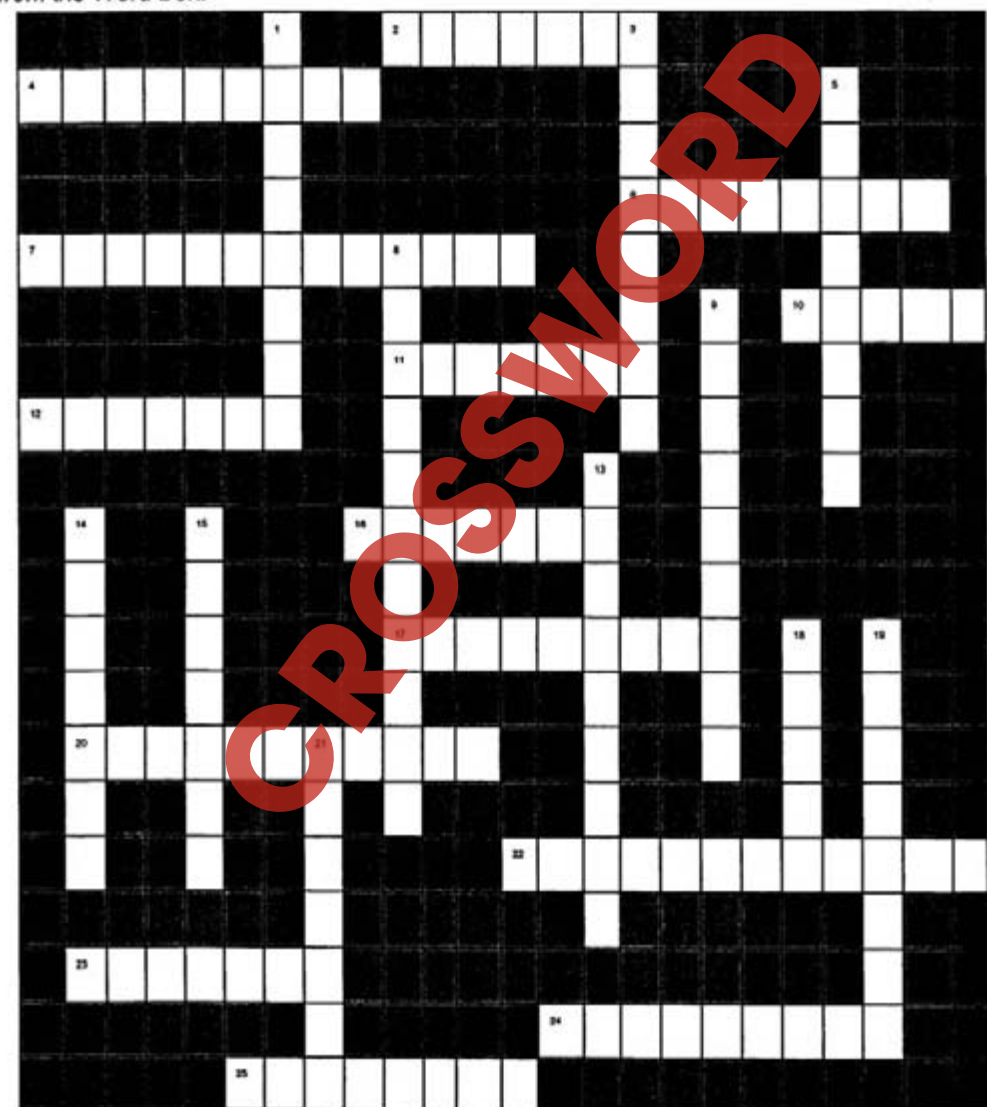
