Year	Milestone
<b>1800s</b>	 <p>Forward thinking women begin to wear pants known as <i>bloomers</i>.</p> 
<b>1900s</b>	<p>Big hats were decorated with feathers, ribbons, and flowers.</p> 
<b>1940s</b>	<p>Women wear full skirts. New fabrics make it easier to wash and wear clothing.</p> 
<b>1960s</b>	<p>Hemlines rise. The mini-skirt is popular. Fun new fabric patterns are designed.</p> 
<b>1980s</b>	<p>This decade is marked by leg warmers, shoulder pads, and parachute pants.</p> 
<b>Today</b>	<p>It seems that anything goes! Everyone brings his or her own personal style to fashion.</p>

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
