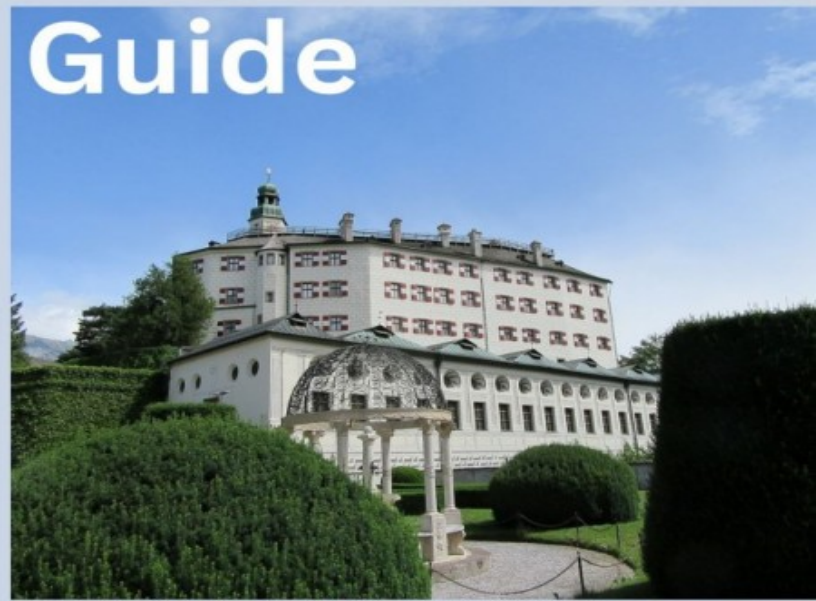

## Innsbruck's 11 Destinations to Visit

### 1. Imperial Palace (Hofburg):

## 2. Golden Roof (Goldenes Dachl):
